DESERT CONSERVATION PROGRAM

The Desert Conservation Program (DCP) manages Endangered Species Act compliance on behalf of Clark County and the cities of Boulder City, Henderson, Las Vegas, North Las Vegas, Mesquite and the Nevada Department of Transportation (NDOT) (collectively, the Permittees) through implementation of the Clark County Multiple Species Habitat Conservation Plan (MSHCP) and associated Section 10(a)(1)(B) incidental take permit. The MSHCP and permit allow private landowners to develop land in Clark County without the need for individual project-by-project consultations and negotiation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife (USFWS) to comply with the Endangered Species Act, providing a streamlined process for compliance. In exchange for this permit, the DCP implements actions to mitigate impacts from development. These actions include research, acquisition of sensitive habitats, habitat restoration, public information and education, the Wild Desert Tortoise Assistance Line, and installation and maintenance of fencing along roadways to reduce tortoise mortality.

BOULDER CITY CONSERVATION EASEMENT (BCCE)

The incidental take permit requires the establishment of a conservation easement in the Eldorado Valley to be managed and protected for the benefit of the desert tortoise (*Gopherus agassizzi*) as partial mitigation for the take of desert tortoise and its habitat. The BCCE was established between Clark County and Boulder City in July of 1995 to fulfill this requirement.

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Continue processing a request from the City of Boulder City for a modification to the BCCE and easement agreement.
- Provided oversight and project management for the interlocal agreement with Boulder City for Law Enforcement on the BCCE.
- Conducted twenty site visits to monitor use, disturbances, and related issues; to perform new signage installation, maintenance and upgrades; for restoration planning and monitoring; and in support of the Predation Study and the Desert Tortoise Occupancy Study.
- Mapping and assessment of unauthorized roads and other disturbances is ongoing and will guide prioritization of restoration activities on the BCCE.

- Met with law enforcement during three site visits to plan patrols to cover areas where unauthorized uses were detected.
- Continued coordination with utility companies based in the Energy Zone in order to meet desert conservation and restoration goals.
- Bird surveys on the BCCE were completed by SWCA Environmental Consultants. The final report is available on the DCP website.
- Small mammal surveys on the BCCE were completed by NewFields. The final report is available on the DCP website.

RIPARIAN RESERVE UNITS

The incidental take permit stipulates that take of covered avian species is conditioned upon the acquisition of private lands in desert riparian habitats along the Muddy and Virgin rivers and the Meadow Valley wash. To comply with this permit condition, the DCP has acquired properties with riparian habitat along the Muddy and Virgin rivers in Clark County. These properties serve to mitigate impacts to covered species and conserve habitats and important connectivity corridors.

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

Muddy River Reserve Unit

- Eagle View Contractors continues ongoing maintenance of the Muddy River Reserve Units.
- Planning efforts for the Southern Nevada Public Land Management Act (SNPLMA) Round 16 project to conduct habitat restoration on the Muddy River Reserve Unit continue. A Request for Proposals (RFP) is currently being prepared to complete the restoration design.
- Monthly data collection on groundwater monitoring wells continues.
- Attended the Biological Advisory
 Committee meeting on September 11th.
- Restoration implementation is ongoing for the SNPLMA Round 14 project to conduct habitat restoration. The National Park Service's (NPS) Exotic Plant Management Team has collected native species and is currently propagating at their nursery. The site will be prepared late 2018/early 2019 and subsequently planted with the propagated plants.
- NPS' Exotic Plant Management Team continues to conduct vegetation management and maintenance activities for enhancement of native riparian species.
- Attended Riparian Habitat Restoration for the Arid Southwest Workshop September 13th – 14th.

Virgin River Reserve Unit

- Continued photo-monitoring documentation of restored areas within Subunit 1.
- Planning efforts for the SNPLMA Round 15 project to conduct 20 to 40 acres of habitat restoration on the Virgin River Reserve Unit continue.
- Attended a workshop with other stakeholders to discuss preliminary planning of a Lower Virgin River Integrated Watershed Management Plan on July 12th.
- Attended the quarterly Virgin River Conservation Partnership meeting on July 19th.

- Participated in the Virgin River Collation Steering Committee meeting on August 13th.
- SWCA completed point count and federally listed species surveys on newly acquired properties on the Virgin River. The final report is available on the DCP website.
- NPS' Exotic Plant Management Team continues to conduct vegetation management and maintenance activities for enhancement of native riparian species.

Property Acquisition

The Board of County Commissioners approved the DCP's request to purchase previously identified properties of interest along the Virgin River in Mesquite, Nevada, in 2017. One parcel closed in Q3 of 2018 and now belongs to the County.



WILD DESERT TORTOISE ASSISTANCE

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

Wild Desert Tortoise Assistance Line

The 1995 Desert Conservation Plan and the 2001 MSHCP require that the DCP provide a hotline and pick up service to deal with wild desert tortoises which are displaced by development or appear to be in harm's way due to construction activity. The DCP operates the wild desert tortoise assistance line to meet this requirement.

No calls were received from the Wild Desert Tortoise Assistance Line during this reporting period.

Desert Tortoise Fencing

Continued planning activities for the construction of post-and-cable and desert tortoise fencing along the boundary of the Tule
Springs Fossil Beds National Monument. This project will go out for bid once the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has completed
their cadastral survey of the monument.

OTHER WORK

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

• We have begun working with the Nevada Division of Minerals to install bat compatible closures on abandoned mine land hazards in the Gold Butte area. These closures will ensure public safety while retaining the value of the associated wildlife habitat.

ADAPTIVE MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

As a requirement of the incidental take permit, the DCP is required to have an Adaptive Management Program (AMP) in order to gauge the effectiveness of existing conservation measures, propose alternative conservation measures as the need arises and to deal with changed or unforeseen circumstances.

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Held a resiliency workshop with DCP employees and the independent Science Advisor Panel on August 14th.
- Held the 2018 MSHCP Annual Project Progress Report Symposium on August 15th.
- Met with the independent Science Advisor Panel on August 16th.
- Represented Clark County during the Desert Tortoise Management Oversight Group meeting on September 13th.
- Met with the USFWS to discuss ongoing range-wide desert tortoise monitoring across Clark County and surrounding areas on September 24th.

Permit Amendment

The DCP continues to pursue a major amendment to the MSHCP and incidental take permit. This amendment would allow for additional take authorization in Clark County while providing long-term assurances to the Clark County community for continued economic growth.

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Continued to meet with the USFWS to discuss issues related to the proposed amendment.
- Continued to work with Permittees on federal legislation that will support efforts to obtain an amended MSHCP. Met with staff in the BLM state office and the Washington D.C. office to brief them on legislative efforts. Also met with staff working for elected officials to begin development of legislation language.
- Continued to administer a contract with Ebbin, Moser + Skaggs, LLP to provide legal counsel services in support of the permit amendment effort.
- Continued to administer a contract with WRA Environmental Consultants to assist with the preparation of documents and analyses that will support development of the MSHCP amendment. Consultants continued developing methods for a habitat functionality analysis that will be used in conducting impact analyses to support the County's application for an amended incidental take permit. Work to complete climate change review worksheets for all proposed covered species are being continued this quarter as well.
- Continued coordination with Nevada Division of Forestry to discuss development of a master permit for the take of state-listed plant species. This permit would provide the MSHCP Permittees with disturbance authorization from the State Forester Firewarden, in accordance with Nevada Revised Statutes, for state-listed plant species in Clark County.

External Agency Coordination and Assistance

In order to keep well informed on the current and future land use impacts to Clark County, the DCP will review and potentially provide comments on issues relevant to Clark County. As a public agency, the DCP also provides data as requested to interested parties.

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Provide assistance to Department of Comprehensive Planning to update the Federal Lands Element of the Comprehensive Plan.
- Prepared letters documenting Endangered Species Act compliance for projects requiring the submittal of flood zone map revision requests to the Federal Emergency Management Agency.



ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Processed vendor payments 65 invoices: 64 accepted (98%), 1 rejected (2%).
- Fiscal Year (FY) 18 Budgets reconciled for end of year close and rolled into new fiscal year. Expenditures continue to be monitored regularly to ensure appropriate spending and reporting occur.
- Phase 1 of converting all the existing credit card terminals to the new processor, Wells Fargo, has been completed. Phase 2 of converting the existing web and IVR systems has been completed. Phase 3 is in process to establish e-payment services for County departments that did not currently offer e-payments.
- Oversight of the SNPLMA Round 8 Round 16 projects totaling \$8,117,515 continues in the County's financial system. The projects continue to be monitored for progress and reimbursement.
- Received reimbursement for SNPLMA projects: Round 8 - 1 draw drown (\$44,610.80), Round 15 - 1 draw down (\$5,000.00).
- Continued development of the 2019-2021 Implementation Plan and Budget. A draft report will be released to the public for review and comment next quarter.

DCP staff is responsible for ensuring that land disturbed pursuant to the MSHCP is accounted for and monies are collected and deposited in the Section 10 special reserve fund established under the MSHCP. 


