Overview and History

The Mojave Max Education Program originated from one of the conservation actions in the MSHCP which was to provide public information and education.

Created by the DCP, and named through a school contest, the Mojave Max mascot was developed in 1994 and quickly became a Las Vegas icon. Additionally, a live desert tortoise named Mojave Max was being moved to a new habitat at the Red Rock Canyon National Conservation Area.

Mojave Max Emergence Contest

The Mojave Max emergence contest is the central element of the education program. The first Mojave Max emergence contest was held in 2000. Assemblies are held in various Clark County schools as a way of bringing education and awareness about the desert tortoise and the Mojave Desert to students.

The Mojave Max Emergence Contest allows contestants to enter a guess as to when they think the live Mojave Max tortoise will wake up from brumation. The student who guesses as close as possible to the correct day, hour, and minute when Max emerges from his burrow wins all sorts of prizes!

In 2013 a total of 5,285 people entered a guess as to when they thought Mojave Max would wake up from brumation. In 2014 a total of 4,589 guesses were received.

The 2014 contest winner was Peyton Burns a 1st grader from Faith Lutheran Academy.

Peyton guessed the exact date and time that Max would emerge which was on April 7, 2014 at 4:10 pm!

Mojave Max Assemblies
