


Nevada Division of Minerals

- State Agency and part of the Commission on Mineral Resources (7 members)
- Offices in Carson City (8 employees) and Las Vegas (3 employees)
- No general fund money in budget, all revenue from fees on minerals industry
- What we Do:
 - Industry Relations and Government Affairs
 - Abandoned Mine Lands Program
 - Oil, Gas, and Geothermal Program
 - Minerals Education, including the Nevada Earth Science Workshops
 - Mines Registry (production and exploration data on mining, oil and gas, and geothermal)
 - State Reclamation Bond Pool


- Gold Butte National Monument Created in 2016
- 2016, NDOW identified key bat habitat in the Virgin Mountains
- 2017, DCP Received funding for protecting Bat habitat in Clark County
- 2018, DCP and NDOM Interlocal Agreement
- 2018, Categorical Exclusion from BLM



Key Factors



- Project spans 220 square miles
- Accessibility
- 18 AML hazards with significant bat habitat
- 42 total know AML hazards within the Monument
- Desert Tortoise habitat found in three AML hazards
- BLM approval for closures

- Total Construction Cost = \$269,349
 - Clark County Desert Conservation Program (DCP) funded \$129,955

Wildlife Benefitting from Mine Habitat

- Bats that regularly, or occasionally, use mines in the Mojave: (Identified by NDOW)
 - Macrotus californicus, California leaf-nosed bat
 - Antrozous pallidus, pallid bat
 - Corynorhinus townsendii, Townsend's big-eared bat
 - Eptesicus fuscus, big brown bat
 - Euderma maculatum, spotted bat
 - Idionycteris phyllotis, Allen's bigeared bat
 - Lasionycteris noctivagans, silverhaired bat
 - Myotis californicus, California myotis
 - Myotis ciliolabrum, western smallfooted Myotis


- Myotis evotis, long-eared myotis
- Myotis lucifugus, little brown bat
- Myotis thysanodes, fringed myotis
- Myotis yumanensis, Yuma myotis
- Parastrellus hesperus, Canyon bat
- Tadarida brasiliensis, Brazilian freetailed bat
- Myotis velifer, Cave myotis
- Other potential wildlife habitat:
 - Desert Tortoise
 - Woodrats
 - Other small desert mammals
 - Ringtail cats


Valley of Fire State Park

Goodsprings




- Remaining 6 BCC within project

- Over a dozen species of bat are in the area






