Today, along with community partners and Clark County Parks and Recreation, I was able to dedicate a new restroom facility and streetscape improvements at Pebble Park located at 8975 Topaz Street. Originally constructed in 2007, the new improvements at Pebble Park include a new public restroom and perimeter landscaping of trees and shrubs along Pebble Road and Eastern Ave. Pebble Park is popular with both neighborhood residents and sports leagues alike. The park has a trail, picnic areas, a playground, a water play feature and a very large green area used by several sports leagues as practice space. The addition of a restroom facility will greatly improve the overall experience for park users. The restroom and landscaping improvements will further incorporate this park into the adjacent neighborhood. Clark County Now Accepting Applications for Small Business Grants

Local small business owners affected by the ongoing pandemic and related closures may qualify for thousands of dollars in free financial assistance from the County.

Applications may be submitted for the second round of the County's Small Business Stabilization Grant, which awards local businesses up to \$5,000 or \$10,000 each (the maximum depends upon how many employees the business has). The funding does not need to be repaid and may be used for working capital to cover general expenditures such as rent, utilities, inventory or payroll.

To qualify for this grant a business must be based in unincorporated Clark County, have a Clark County business license and have 20 or fewer employees. Business owners who unsuccessfully applied for these funds in June are encouraged to apply again as some eligibility provisions have changed. Also, businesses that received funding from a County grant earlier this year may apply for this second round of funding.

Additional information about the grant qualifications and the application are available through the County Community and Economic Development website at www.ClarkCountyNV.gov/EconomicDevelopment. Applications are due by 11:59 p.m. Sept. 29.

"Thousands of small businesses here and across the country are barely hanging on," Commission Chairman Marilyn Kirkpatrick said. "This program is an investment in our community that will keep businesses open and people working."

"Empty storefronts and unemployed workers are terrible for neighborhoods and tragic for the affected families," Commissioner Michael Naft said. "By supporting small businesses when they need it most, we can ease their financial strain and help save the jobs that support thousands of families in Southern Nevada."

"The County was able to help more than 500 local small businesses through our grant programs earlier this year, and we hope to double that number during this second round," Commissioner James B. Gibson said. "People who have never needed assistance before may desperately need it now. So please, apply for this financial lifeline and help us help you keep your doors open and your employees on the payroll."

Earlier this summer, the County distributed over \$2 million to more than 500 businesses through small business grant programs aimed at assisting those hurt by the pandemic. Funding for the grant programs comes from the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) CARES Act. Commissioners visited J Gursey Coffee Roasters, which was awarded a County small business grant earlier this year, today to announce that second-round grant applications are now available.

Officials Urge Residents to Participate in Census Before Sept. 30 Deadline

Clark County Response Rate Is 66 Percent

With just two weeks left to participate in the 2020 U.S. Census, Clark County officials are encouraging any local households that haven't participated to get counted as soon as possible.

Since March when people could begin taking the Census, 66 percent of households in Clark County have filled out their Census forms, with 55.4 percent responding online. The participation rate for Nevada is 65.6 percent, while the national response rate is 65.9 percent. The deadline to respond to the 2020 Census count is Sept. 30.

"This year it's easier than ever to participate in the Census online, by phone or by mail, and it's one of the most important things you can do to help our community," said Clark County Commission Chairman Marilyn Kirkpatrick. "A complete count will help Nevada and our community get its fair share of federal funding over the next 10 years for schools, roads, health care and other needs that will be vital to our economic recovery as we put the COVID-19 pandemic behind us."

The 2020 Census form can be filled out online over the U.S. Census Bureau's website at www.2020Census.gov or by phone or mail. The Census Bureau is operating toll-free language assistance lines in multiple languages including the three most common spoken in Southern Nevada: English (844) 330-2020; Spanish (844) 468-2020; and Tagalog (844) 478-2020. The Census Bureau also is offering American Sign Language support and has a toll-free Telephone Display Device (TDD) number of (844) 467-2020. Information about the Census is available on the Southern Nevada Counts website at www.SouthernNevadaCounts.com.

Officials say in the 2010 Census, Nevada's population was undercounted with only 60.4 percent of households participating. Children under 5 tend to be the most undercounted of all Nevadans.

""We are happy to report that our participation rate is better than the last Census, but time is ticking to get the most complete count possible for 2020," said Clark County Commission Vice Chairman Lawrence Weekly. "Data collected from the Census means funding for many community services over the next 10 years. We need everyone who lives here to be counted so we get our fair share of funding."

The results of the Census, taken every 10 years, help decide how billions of dollars in funding is distributed to states and communities over the next decade, and are used to determine how many Congressional seats get allocated to each state. Nevada stands to receive more than \$6 billion each year over the next 10 years based on 2020 Census data. The funding helps pay for transportation projects, Medicare and Medicaid assistance, emergency services, job training, and a variety of programs for children including school lunches, health insurance, foster care and federal Pell Grants for college students.

"We are grateful to those who have participated in the Census so far, and encourage anyone who hasn't participated yet to get online or call the Census Bureau as soon as possible to be counted," said Clark County Commissioner Justin Jones, chairman of the Southern Nevada Regional Planning Coalition, which initiated the Southern Nevada Counts effort. "The process only takes a few minutes and the results will be a significant help to our community over the next ten years."

One person per household fills out the questionnaire on behalf of everyone who lives at the address as of Census Day on April 1, 2020. The questions ask for names, ages, birthdates and races of residents, and whether the home is owned or rented. By law, information provided for the Census is confidential and not allowed to be shared with immigration or law enforcement agencies or the courts. The U.S. Census Bureau is required to use census responses for statistical purposes only.

"We have a large and diverse immigrant population in Southern Nevada that needs to be counted in the census, so our community gets the representation and funding it deserves from Washington," said Clark County Commissioner Tick Segerblom, who also serves on the Southern Nevada Regional Planning Coalition. "We want people to understand that the information they provide for the census is confidential by law and cannot be used against them in any way by any government agency or court. Census information is used for statistical purposes only, and a complete count is critical to Southern Nevada's health and well-being over the next 10 years."

`Stop, Swab & Go!' Drive-Thru Program Operating Until Sept. 25th

Clark County and local health officials are encouraging anyone who attended large gatherings over Labor Day weekend or meets other recommended testing guidance to get tested for COVID-19 to help limit the spread of the virus in the community.

"After a big weekend like Labor Day, it's important to remind people to get tested for COVID-19 in case they came into contact with someone who may have had the virus without knowing it," said Clark County Commission Chairman Marilyn Kirkpatrick, a member of the Southern Nevada Health District's Board of Health. "This virus is silent and invisible and can be spread by people who have the virus but aren't exhibiting symptoms. Until a vaccine becomes available, testing will continue to be an important part of our community's strategy to fight COVID-19 along with the three W's – wash your hands, watch your distance and wear your face covering."

Health officials recommend a COVID-19 test for people if:

- You have symptoms of COVID-19 including fever, cough, or shortness of breath.
- You have been in close contact with someone who has a confirmed or possible case of COVID-19.
- You were in a setting where you were exposed to a large crowd and people were not wearing face coverings or maintaining social distancing.
- You are planning to visit someone at high risk for COIVD-19 illness, including people 65 years of age and older or people with serious medical conditions.

"The Southern Nevada Health District encourages everyone to get tested," said Dr. Fermin Leguen, Acting Chief Health Officer of the Southern Nevada Health District. "Testing is especially important for anyone with symptoms or for anyone who does not have symptoms but has been in close contact with a confirmed or possible case, or was exposed to a large crowd with little or no social distancing or people wearing face coverings. Testing and contact tracing, in addition to wearing masks in public places, and keeping social distancing (six feet apart from others) are how we can lessen the impact of COVID-19 in our community."

The "Stop, Swab & Go" COVID-19 testing program is operating at four drive-thru Las Vegas Valley locations through Friday this week, and will continue to operate at two sites next week at Texas Station Hotel & Casino and Fiesta Henderson from Monday, Sept. 21 to Friday, Sept. 25. Hours of operation are 6 a.m. to 2

p.m. The tests are free, self-administered nasal swabs. No proof of health insurance is required. The tests are available to anyone who wants to be tested, including families and children. The public can register online for appointments at www.bolNeedaCOVID19Test.com. Those who arrive without appointments can register on site upon arrival. Locations include:

In addition, two community-based testing sites operated by University Medical Center and community partners are open five days a week, Tuesday through Saturday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Cashman Center Exhibit Hall A in downtown Las Vegas, 850 N. Las Vegas Boulevard, and the UNLV Thomas & Mack Center's Strip View Pavilion Room off Tropicana Avenue and University Drive. Appointments can be booked online through UMC's website at www.umcsn.com. While appointments are encouraged, walk-up testing stations are available at both locations for those who arrive without appointments. Those with no online access or limited access may call UMC at (702) 383-2619 to schedule appointments.

Clark County, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and the state of Nevada partnered to make 60,000 COVID-19 tests available in our community as part of "Stop, Swab and Go" testing program. The Clark County Fire Department and the Nevada National Guard are providing logistical support for the "Stop, Swab & Go," while the federal government is providing the test kits, sample collection staff, lab capacity, and registration services. Clark County and state officials requested the additional resources as part of a federal program initiated by the White House and Coronavirus Task Force to offer surge testing in hot spots across the country.

The registration website for the "Stop, Swab & Go" event, www.DolNeedaCOVID19Test.com, is managed by eTrueNorth, a HHS program contractor. Individuals must register to be tested by creating a username and password to schedule an appointment on the site. They will be prompted to print a voucher or take a screen shot of it with their cell phone camera to present upon arrival for their testing appointment. Results should be available within two to five business days after the date of specimen collection. Individuals will be notified by email when their test result is available. Results are only given via the website and individuals must log into the website to obtain their test results using the same username and password they created when scheduling their appointments. The telephone number to the eTrueNorth call center is (800) 635-8611. As the demand for COVID-19 testing is high so is call volume to the call center. Individuals who need help obtaining their test result can revisit the website to learn their username or reset their password.

All test results, positive or negative, will be reported to the Southern Nevada Health District. Anyone notified of a positive test result is encouraged to follow-up with their primary care physician and to stay home and self-isolate to limit the spread of the virus. The Health District will follow up only with people who test positive for the virus as part of its local contact tracing and disease investigation efforts.

Since May, Clark County and community partners have conducted 197,188 tests as part of its community testing program. The number includes more than 21,000 tests that have been conducted as part of the "Stop, Swab and Go" program, 34,291 tests at Cashman Center and 14,850 at the UNLV Thomas and Mack Center Strip Pavilion Room, as well as 22,989 tests at one and two-day strike team events conducted with the Southern Nevada Health District at various locations.

People with general questions about COVID-19 can call the health district's Information Phone Line at (702) 759-INFO (4636), between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. Anyone in need of social service support to self-isolate can contact Nevada 2-1-1 for resource referrals. Information about COVID-19 resources also is available in Spanish through the "Esta En Tus Manos" (It's in your hands) outreach initiative at estaentusmanosnevada.com. The health district has a calendar of testing events in English and Spanish posted at www.SNHD.info/covid.

Henderson Libraries has just the opportunity

Do you know teenagers that are trying to find pandemic-friendly volunteer opportunities? In an effort to assist the many teens looking for chances to earn these valuable hours, Henderson Libraries has re-launched its Teen Service Club.

This club is now offering projects for youth ages 11-17 and it's as easy as stopping by a Henderson Libraries location (check hendersonlibraries.com for location addresses) to pick up a packet of supplies (one kit per teen) via the curbside pickup service. The club is kicking off with its first project—creating "thank you" notes for healthcare workers in Southern Nevada. These notes will be dropped off at Henderson Hospital and other Valley Health System locations.

"All levels of employees at these institutions have been working hard to keep our families and neighbors healthy during this unprecedented health crisis, and this is a small way to demonstrate our gratitude," shares Henderson Libraries Assistant Library Manager/Youth Services Department Head Bethany Lafferty. "We will be providing kits with supplies to get started and the kids will need to provide their own glue, markers, paint, and whatever else they'd like to use to complete the decoration and write a message."

Lafferty notes that many educational and civic organizations, as well as a variety of scholarship applications, require volunteer hours as criteria. Creating these cards using their artistic skills will earn students 15 minutes of service time for each note card completed. Finished cards need to be turned back in to a library location (via curbside pickup) by September 30, 2020 and service time will be calculated based upon the return slips for each participant. A letter detailing the service hours will be sent via email to the participant after September 30th.

Established in 1944 as a single library in Downtown Henderson, Henderson Libraries operates four locations in Henderson, providing free access to materials, programs, and services to meet the diverse and varied needs of the community throughout Southern Nevada. General Election Early Voting Is October 17 (Saturday) to October 30 (Friday), 2020

Any registered voter in Clark County may vote in-person before Election Day at any early voting site. VOTING IS EASY at the 35 convenient early voting sites per day during October 17-30 or on Election Day at any of the over 100 Vote Centers. During early voting, go to www.clarkCountyNV.gov/Vote for a link to an interactive, mobile device enabled map for finding that day's nearby sites and their approximate wait times.

You may also drop-off voted mail ballots in-person at any early voting site during the hours listed in the schedule. Not all locations will be open every day during early voting.

If you decide to vote in-person instead of by mail, you will need to do one of the following:

- If you have your mail ballot, surrender your voted or unvoted mail ballot (preferably in the packet sent to you) to an election official at the voting site.
- If you do <u>not</u> have your mail ballot, you will sign an affirmation at the voting site swearing that you have not already voted in the current election and that you understand no one may attempt to vote or actually vote more than once in the same election.
